I was touched when my son sent me this photograph (attached) of a plaque outside his lecture hall at Lancaster university commemorating George Fox. He put a comment on the picture which said "Your Squad mum", which I really liked.

More importantly I thought it was wonderful that this plaque was placed outside his lecture hall.

But for me living in the north west, passing Swarthmore Hall on a daily basis is what sparked my interest in the Quakers. Who were they? What was their belief system? The more I read the more I knew this is where I belonged. I am still a trainee Quaker being pulled from my lifelong Anglicanism, which is hard at times for me, but I'm learning how to become a Quaker. It's slow progress but I'm getting there.

I thought I'd share this because I thought it was wonderful that this was on the wall of a university lecture theatre, but living in the north west and becoming curious about George Fox et al resulted in my pursuit of Quakerism.

#### **Book Reviews**

George Fox's 'BOOK OF MIRACLES' with an introduction and notes by Henry J Cadbury. ISBN 978-1-108-04503-2.

This is not a book of critical analysis nor is it an easy read and the notes provided need to be consulted a lot. Early Friends kept quiet about Fox's Healing Ministry. They were nervous the he would be accused of witchcraft and the bible injunction 'thou shalt not suffer a witch to live' (Exodus 22 verse 18) rang in their ears. Fox didn't limit his cures to Friends, he would try to help almost anyone who asked. About 150 cases of both physical and mental illness are are recorded with various degrees of success. Failures are NOT mentioned very often if at all!. The long forward to the book throws some light on the miracles and I found it has some interest as Quaker history, but to me the miracles are not proven.

'Quakers in Conflict' by Larry Ingle, Professor of History at the University of Tennessee. ISBN 0-87574-926-7.

This is an account of the 'Hicksite' reformation which split American Quakerism in 1827/28. The conflict was not only about doctrine but a struggle for power within Friends. The struggle came alive for me as I read the book. Quakers in the early 1800s had divided reactions to the intrusion into their precious Society of evangelical doctrines then common in all protestant churches. This was the origin of the conflict and the split. Though 'weighty' (powerful?) urban Quakers embraced evangelicalism the traditional mostly rural Friends did not. Regarding it as alien and something which could obliterate the peculiar ways of the Society and finally destroy that 'hedge' against the wicked world.

The author links the Quaker experience and the eternal question, which has the greater authority - the testimony of personal religious experience or the collective weight of the scriptures and church doctrine? Elias Hicks was the catalyst and there was a considerable commotion as American Yearly Meetings struggled with the issue and most of them split, only to reunite in the mid 1900s. The issue contributed to our modern view of individualism - that people should be allowed to believe what they wish.

Reading the book it seems to me that both sides were closer to each other than they acknowledged at the time. It was a struggle.without love, over lilliputian issues and at the end both sides held in their lean hands fragments of the precious alabaster vessel that had been shattered.

When I worked in New York I attend Meeting at Westbury on Long Island. There were two Meeting Houses on the property, a 'Hicksite' one which Friends used, and an 'Orthodox' one which was let to the Buddhists (I think), BUT there was only one stable block on the site. The 'Orthodox' and 'Hicksite' horses could share but not Friends. Maybe there is a lesson there?!
